We have been called into an association because we share in a common love for the same Person—Jesus Christ—and in the gift of the

Prophecy from the ADL Meeting, September 11, 2022

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God Opens Eyes, Shakes Up with Surprise, Puts Mouths in a Vise!

Homily on the Transfiguration by Fr. Charles "Chuck" Wood

afraid....

"Now Peter and those who were with him were heavy with sleep, but when they were fully awake, they saw his glory. ...

"Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, ... Let's make three tents ...' While he said these things, a cloud came and overshadowed them, and they were

"A voice came out of the cloud, saying, 'This is my beloved Son. *Listen to him!*" (Lk 9:32–33, 34, 35; emphasis mine).

Let's breakdown the miraculous event of the Transfiguration into the three mini-events in the above Scripture verses. They show what God might do and might call us to, when we "stand in the gap for one another" (see Ez 22:30 and Ps 106:23). But first, let's breakdown the word, "gap."

It might make some people think of the retail clothing/fashion company that started in 1969 with its "Gap" stores. That new company's target customers who were on the younger side of the "generation gap", which a lot of people identified as causing the cultural eruptions of the time. Reliable sources report that when the company's founders chose its name, that's the "gap" they had in mind.

But another Christian once told me that what comes to mind when she sees that brand's "GAP" logo, is "God Answers Prayer!"

When we stand in that "G.A.P.," God can "do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think" (Eph 3:20). Among God's abundant works, three are in today's Gospel (Lk 9:28b-36).

First, God can wake us from sleep (see v. 32). Maybe it's the slumber of sin; maybe the drowsiness of indifference to injustice. No matter! God opens our eyes to divine glory at work in us and around us. That fresh watchfulness reveals opportunities for God to work through you, using you to pull down strongholds of evil and to build up what's holy (see 1 Pt 5:8, 2 Cor 10:4, Phil 2:13).

Those opportunities might surprise, even frighten, you. No matter! That's like the Apostles, "afraid" when God arrived (Lk 9:34). Challenges like that are a second way God answers prayer. See, when praying that God's will be done, we stand in the G.A.P. for others—or they, for us. In answer, God might shake things up and surprise us with new callings and new graces to fulfill them.

Our response, like Peter's here, might be to suggest "better" ways. Then God might move to put our lips in a "metal tool with movable jaws that holds an object firmly in place while work is done on it."

That is, God might put your mouth in a vise and say, "The only 'movable jaws' here should belong to my Son and my 'Holy Vise,' aka the Holy Spirit!" (My paraphrase of Lk 9:35, where God the Father say, "Listen to him!"). Yes, God's answer to prayer can mirror the Transfiguration's third mini-event, the command to listen. Is God holding your mouth firmly in place while he works on you? No matter! If today God clamps down on you, in due time he'll amp up your witnessing voice for proclaiming his Good News.

Does God need to open our eyes, shake us up with surprise, or put our mouths in a vise? Let's humbly yet boldly pray, "Bring it on!" and trust that we'll thrive as God transfigures us ... especially if we stand in the "G.A.P." for one another.

Catholic Charismatic Renewal in San Antonio, TX

The Charismatic Renewal came to San Antonio, TX in 1969-70. We are blessed that, since 1987, we've had a two-story building that is the home for the Catholic Center for Charismatic Renewal, San Antonio. We have a chapel, a store selling religious books and articles, meeting rooms, a main office and a youth

office. I am the director of the Center in a part-time fashion. I am also the pastor of a church and the moderator of our charismatic religious community, the Brothers of the Beloved Disciple. We have an Assistant Director and many volunteers who staff the bookstore, do the finances, care for the building, etc. We have an English Service Committee, a Spanish Service Committee, and a Youth Service Committee; all of them work with me in discerning and planning the directions and programs of the Center. We work with about 40 prayer groups in the Archdiocese of San Antonio.

Our Vision Statement says: "We seek to be a reminder of the importance of the Holy Spirit in every aspect of Catholic life. We foster:

- 1) A Grace for Renewal in the Holy Spirit: The dynamic grace of baptism in the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:5) which empowered the members of the early church at Pentecost. Baptism in the Holy Spirit is an adult affirmation, and renewal, of the graces of the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation.
- 2) A Lifestyle in the Holy Spirit: A relationship and lifestyle in the Holy Spirit where we depend daily on our Advocate for love, inspiration, guidance, wisdom, growth in holiness, empowerment, and gifts for building up the body of Christ (service and evangelization).

We believe in the importance of being an active member of a prayer/faith—sharing group to resist the bad influences in our culture, and to be able to support each other in our Catholic lifestyle.

Our Mission Statement says that we are: "An evangelistic ministry of the Archdiocese of San Antonio seeking to invite people to experience a life-changing personal relationship with Jesus Christ, and ongoing life in the Spirit through prayer groups, Life in the Spirit Seminars, a yearly conference, renewal days, youth

ministry, prayer ministry, spiritual gifts workshops, and other training programs that are offered at the Center and at parishes, so that we can follow the call of Pope Francis to live as missionary disciples and Spirit-filled evangelizers." We offer both English and Spanish programs.

Besides the Vision and Mission Statements our introductory pamphlet explains five major focuses for charismatic renewal:

- 1) Charismatic Renewal Focuses on the Role of the Holy Spirit in the Church.
- 2) The Value of Receiving Baptism in the Holy Spirit.
- 3) The Value of Receiving Charisms (spiritual gifts) for Service and Evangelization.
 - 4) The Value of the Prayer of Praise and Worship.
 - 5) The Value of Prayer Group Communities.

Like everyone, we have been in the process of refocusing—and discerning God's direction—as everything was slowed down because of COVID-19. We are bringing our leaders and groups together to renew the vision for the current of grace of charismatic renewal. People need to understand Pope Francis' vision for the Renewal. People need to again be presented with the basics of what charismatic renewal is about. We are seeking to help people to understand this better, and to recommit ourselves to the grace of charismatic renewal. We seek to find ways to help our dioceses, priests, lay leaders and others to understand baptism in the Holy Spirit and the full role of the Holy Spirit.

As a member of the CHARIS National Service of Communion USA, I am a member of a committee that is putting together a document, and exploring other means (internet, etc.) of better explaining baptism in the Holy Spirit to the whole Church. We hope to have that document with other suggestions available by the beginning of 2023. Please keep this effort in prayer.
