Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

In an email dated April 19, 2018, I received a link to eight documents that sketch out a timeline of activity on the international level pertaining to the formation of a new international service for the Catholic Char-

ismatic Renewal. This new service will be called the Catholic Charismatic Renewal International Service or CHARIS for short. On June 9, 2019, on the Solemnity of Pentecost, its statutes come into force, bringing together the goods and patrimony of the International Catholic Charismatic Renewal Services (ICCRS) and the Catholic Fraternity of Charismatic Covenant Communities and Fellowships (CF). At that point, both of these organizations will no longer exist.

A great deal of conversation in the Renewal has happened over the last month-and-a-half trying to figure out what this exactly means. In reading the documents, I discern a theme that seems to emerge throughout. In the process of restructuring, an invitation is made to focus on communion over governance. I believe that this is of particular importance to us as diocesan liaisons. While each of

us performs the work of liaison with great diversity—reflective of the differences of our bishops and dioceses, we should recognize a shared call to foster communion among the many and diverse members of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal in our respective (arch)dioceses. Challenging? Yes. Important? Yes.

Whenever structures change, we are provided an opportunity to look anew at ourselves. The creation of CHARIS affords us as liaisons the possibility to examine the role we fulfill individually and as an association. My hope is that the attention that this new structuring brings to the Renewal will prompt more bishops to appoint liaisons to aid them. This will, in turn, give us the possibility of associating with more liaisons in the hope of helping all of us

fulfill the needs of the local Church and the Renewal. Be assured that as we learn more about the role CHARIS will play for us and our work, we will pass that on to you. God bless.

ADL Convocation in Beaverton, OR April 9-13, 2018

Joe Malen and I have just recently been appointed by our Bishop as the Liaison and Associate Liaison, respectively, to the Diocese of Fairbanks, AK. We have replaced Gail Reidman who served admirably for many years.

We did not know what to expect as we arrived in Portland, OR

for the 2018 ADL Convocation but were expectant. The shuttle brought us to Our Lady of Peace Retreat House in Beaverton, OR and we were greeted by a Sister dressed in a black habit, one of the Franciscan Missionary Sisters of Our Lady of Sorrows. This community of women religious run the retreat house as one of their main apostolates.

After dinner, our first night, Fr. Anthony Ouellette, Chairperson of the ADL Steering Committee, welcomed us, and we began to praise and worship our Lord. The Holy Spirit spread the gift of tongues to almost everyone in the room. Prophetic words that participants received and gave included, "I am doing a new thing." Someone also relayed the vision of a "River of Grace that God is pouring out to the Church."

The next morning brought us a presentation from Jim Murphy, President of the International Catholic Charismatic Renewal Services (ICCRS). His talk's title was, "Fear Not, Stand Firm, and See the Salvation of God." From Exodus 14:13, the core of the message was, "Do not fear! Stand firm and see the salvation of the Lord which He will accomplish for you today." He expanded on the Presentation paper he sent to us prior to the Convocation.

After a break, Jim gave us another presentation, a letter from Pope Francis. My thoughts went to the prophetic word previously given "I am doing a new thing." Could this be the "new thing" God was talking about? The letter stated that, we, the Charis-

matic Catholics, are not merely a sub-section within the Church, but we are what the Church should be. There will be a communion of grace of Baptism in the Spirit which includes all charismatic realities. The Holy Father puts us under one Current of Grace.

Wednesday morning, we traveled to downtown Portland, OR to St Mary's Cathedral for Mass with the Portland Archdiocese's Auxiliary Bishop, Peter Smith. The concelebrants were the seven priests who were attending the Convocation. One of the deacons attending the Convocation assisted at the altar.

The Gathering of National Leadership Groups

Each year the steering committee for the ADL goes to a meeting called the "Gathering of National Leadership Groups Catholic Charismatic Renewal." This gathering is an outgrowth of a group formed about 30 years ago called the Committee of 5. In those days, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, five individuals gathered to work on

unity in the charismatic renewal. Its primary goal was relational and restorative. It was formed at a time when the renewal was experiencing growing pains, and significant stressors and tensions challenged unity AMONG the various streams of renewal.

This group grew to include not just individuals but leadership teams from the various streams. Its current make up includes the steering committee

from the ADL, the service committees from the English speaking, Hispanic, Haitian, Filipino, Korean, and other ethnic renewals and representatives from the covenant communities. Its primary strength has continued to be relational. Tensions among the various parts have lessened, and many positive relations have been developed.

Over the years, the leadership groups have worked together on a number of common projects including national conferences for the 40th and 45th anniversaries of the Charismatic Renewal, the Covenant of Understanding, Unity and Vision Statements, the five-year plan leading up to the Jubilee, the Gathering "Plus," which celebrated the 50th

end at the Ark and the Dove, and the Jubilee Celebration in Pittsburgh, PA.

In January 2018, the Gathering met in Miami. Michelle Moran, past president of ICCRS was our presenter to talk about what Pope Francis was then calling the "One Services." Michelle was one of four persons working with the pope to realign how the Catholic Charismatic Renewal relates to the institutional

Church. Michelle recognized that the Gathering has been and continues to be an organic structure that allows for the growth and incorporation of the ongoing fruits of Renewal to encourage evangelism and ecumenism.

Since that meeting, One Service has been renamed CHA-RIS. It outlines international, continental, and national leadership structures that set out to unify how the charismatic renewal relates to the Church.

Although the Gathering of National Leadership Groups has never worked on structural unity, it has set the groundwork for all the streams of renewal working together. As we seek a national response to the pope's initiative, all the effort of our Steering Committee and the work of the other leadership groups will pay dividends as we come together to form a national structure. It is an exciting time to be charismatic and take part in this "current of grace for the whole church."

Nothing Could "Eclipse" Our Celebration: 50th Jubilee of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal, Salem, OR, August 18-19, 2017

Part 1 — August 18, the Friday before last year's total eclipse, opened a regional Celebration of 50 years of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal in the United States. It began with a late evening Mass, celebrated by Portland's Archbishop, Alexander Sample. We were also honored to have as concelebrants, Fr. Chuck Wood,

Archdiocesan CCR Liaison, and Msgr. Richard Huneger, pastor of St. Joseph Parish, Salem, OR where the celebration was taking place. Deacon Leo Rasca, assisting at the altar, also serves at St. Joseph's.

It happened that, Salem, the state capital, was in the path of totality for the upcoming solar eclipse. This fact made the Western Oregon CCR Service Team—the celebration's planners—a bit nervous at first, wondering if an onrush of early eclipse watchers might complicate logistics, lodging, and traffic. But nothing of the sort occurred, thank God.

In his homily, Archbishop Sample spoke about the Gifts of the Holy Spirit, our Baptismal gifts, Confirmation gifts, Charismatic gifts, and the Fruit of the Spirit. He mentioned that our Baptismal and Confirmation gifts are meant for us, to help us in our relationship with God. The Charismatic gifts, on the other hand, were given to us to share with others. He

That's the diocese where he was ordained a priest in 1990—a few months short of his 30th birthday—and from which Pope Benedict XVI appointed him as bishop in 2005.

After Mass, Fr. Wood welcomed us to the celebration, in his capacity as one of our CCR Liaisons. His exhortation was meant to stir up our eager anticipation of what we would experience and of what God would do for us through the next day's line-up of events.

The evening was very fruitful, and we left for our hotels and homes with real expectation and hope.
